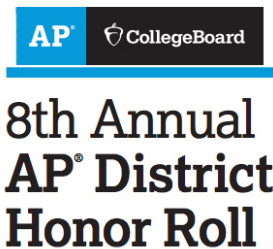

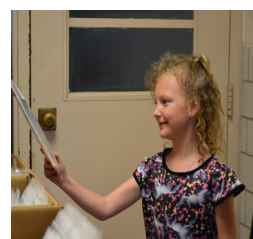

STUDENT SERVICES

At Vandalia-Butler City Schools, we offer a variety of programs and services to ensure all students receive the appropriate instruction, enrichment, and support to succeed. We provide a broad range of programs and services including special education, specialized programming for English Language Learners, home instruction, gifted acceleration, and school attendance.

GIFTED SERVICES

The Gifted Department manages the district's services for identified gifted students. The department offers a continuum of services, including academic acceleration and enrichment opportunities.



TITLE I

The Title I Program is a federally supplemental reading program provided to children who show a need for additional reading instruction. Title I supplemental instruction focuses on developing reading skills within the classroom, small groups, or individual instruction. This reading instruction is given in addition to the reading instruction provided in the classroom.



SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

School nurses facilitate positive student responses to normal development, promote health and safety, intervene with actual and potential health problems, provide case management services, and actively collaborate with others to build student and family capacity for adaptation, self-management, self-advocacy, and learning.



SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES

School psychological services support families, schools, and the community in meeting the academic and mental health needs of students. Our school psychologists consult with parents, teachers, and other professionals to promote student well being and achievement. They develop specific preventions and intervention programs for students, advocate sound educational practices for all students, and provide formal assessments of a child's abilities, learning styles, emotional development, and social skills.

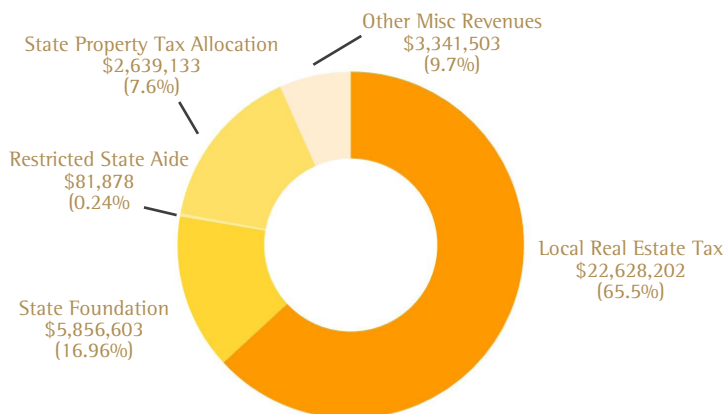

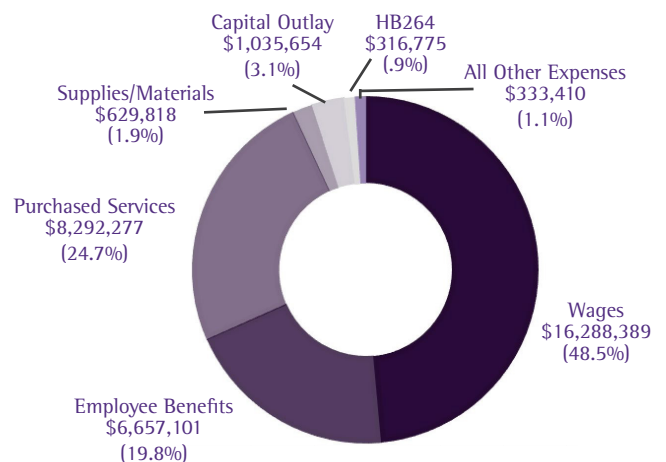

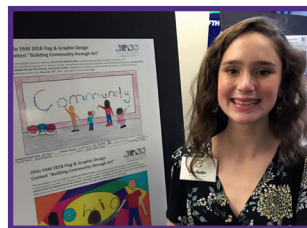
**MORTON HONORS

BUTLER HIGH SCHOOL

 SHOES 4 THE SHOELESS - 25 Morton NJHS members partnered with Shoes 4 the Shoeless to provide shoes and socks for nearly 200 Demmitt Elementary students.


 MYSA - Members of the Morton Youth Service Association completed many service projects over the year including a sock drive for Project Believe, volunteering at the House of Bread soup kitchen, volunteering at the Demmitt father/daughter dance, helping out at the Mom's Mart, creating Christmas cards for Children's Hospital, and gift wrapping for Project Believe.

MORTON MIDDLE SCHOOL


 DESIGN LAB - Students in Smith's Design Lab program learned the design process and how to solve a problem related to a specific theme. The theme during the 2017-18 school year was food. Students created a model using floor, sectional, and elevation plans along with a focus on environmentally friendly materials and energy sources.


 SPECIAL WISH FOUNDATION - Smith 4th and 5th graders raised \$5448.98 for the Special Wish Foundation and combined with a \$5000 donation from community Bob Crotty, the Smith students were able to help grant three wishes!

 SAFETY PATROL - 26 students participated in safety patrol at Helke. As part of safety patrol, students helped the crossing guard at the entrance and exit of the parking lot, helped monitor our students at arrival time, and assisted with the bus lines at the end of the day.

 M.O.S.T. - 43 Helke 2nd and 3rd graders made up the Making Others Smile Today club. This service club collected pop tabs for the Ronald McDonald House, made Valentine's Day cards for the senior center, held a book drive for project reads, cleaned up the Helke grounds, and made placemats for a Vandalia nursing home. The club also sold 1110 candy canes in two days allowing them to donate \$328.69 to SICSA Pet Adoptions.

 MILEAGE CLUB - During the school year, the B.A.S.E. after-school program at Demmitt Elementary offers a free program where students can walk the track behind the school. Over 20 students walked a total of 10 miles throughout the school year, and two students hit the 50-mile mark.

 GOTR - As part of the Girls on the Run program at Demmitt Elementary, the girls practiced running while learning lessons on real beauty. During practice, each girl would run from one coach to another, striking a pose for different beautiful characteristics. After they finished, the girls each wrote the name of a person in their life who exhibited each of the traits.

 PRESCHOOL - Both morning and afternoon preschool classes visited the Crossroads Rehabilitation & Nursing Home on December 13, to sing holiday songs for the residents.

PARENT AND COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

The VBCSD is proud to have such strong partnerships with local businesses and organizations within our community. These partnerships help us ensure our students receive a world-class education.

ATHLETIC BOOSTERS

The Vandalia-Butler Athletic Department in cooperation with the Vandalia-Butler Athletic Boosters worked together to raise \$100,000 for a new weight room at Butler High School.

Butler High School Alumni, David and Cheryl Kudla agreed to match the first \$25,000 toward the project. A total of \$70,000 was raised through the Kudlas and community donations. The Athletic Boosters donated the remaining amount for the project.

No tax dollars were used to fund this project.

GRANTS

VBCSD received a record \$10,000 in grants to fund innovative classroom initiatives from the Visions Endowment Fund.

Here are this year's awards:

- \$3,000 to Smith Middle School for fifth graders, including students with disabilities, to work with a Muse Machine artist-in-residence to create a script from scratch in four days and stage an original performance.
- \$2,100 to Helke Elementary School for first graders to work with a Muse Machine artist-in-residence on creating a script, choreography, and music for a live performance.
- \$1,974 for six high-tech portable data collection devices for science students at Butler High School.
- \$1,000 for workbooks for academically struggling students at Morton Middle School.
- \$611.94 to provide a mobile science center, live animals and exploration materials for Vandalia Preschool at Demmitt Elementary School.
- \$500 to pilot a reading program at Morton Middle School that improves reading levels by engaging students in reading a set of books in a series.
- \$415 for new classroom furniture and other tools to help students at Demmitt Elementary School focus better in the classroom.
- \$300 from the Vandalia-Butler Foundation's Cotterman Fund for yoga classes at Vandalia Preschool.
- \$250 from the Vandalia-Butler Foundation's Cotterman Fund to hire an art instructor to provide lessons to Vandalia Preschool students.

PTA/PTO

Morton, Smith, Demmitt, and Helke each benefit from strong, active PTA or PTO organizations. These parent groups sponsor fundraising, carnivals, parties and more.



SAFETY AND SECURITY

The safety and security of all students, staff, and visitors is a top priority in our district. Our team works closely with Vandalia Police and Fire as well as Butler Township Police and Fire Departments to ensure we maintain a close working relationship with our community's local first responders. In our efforts to continue building and improving a culture of safety throughout the District, we are focusing on five components.

■ Building Security

All of our school buildings are equipped with camera systems and audio/video intercoms for enhanced access control. Each building also has key card access for staff.



■ Safety / Security Practices

Restricted access to all of our buildings. All entry doors will be locked, and we do not allow ANY propping of doors.



■ Trainings for Students and Staff

Vandalia-Butler Schools takes Safety practices very seriously. The following are practices that we have to help with the safety of all our students and staff.

A.L.I.C.E Training (A= Alert L=Lockdown I=Inform C=Counter E=Evacuate) for Staff and Students.

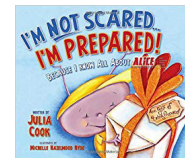

■ Mental Health

We added additional school psychologists and counselors to the District. These additions allow for three counselors at Butler High School, one and a half at Morton Middle School, one at Smith Middle School, and one split between Demmitt Elementary and Helke Elementary. We have also added a Medicaid Counselor at no cost to the District and an SBIRT counselor at Morton and Butler, which is grant funded.

SBIRT is through Samaritan Behavioral and is a comprehensive, integrated, public health approach to the delivery of early intervention and treatment services for persons with substance use and mental health disorders, as well as those who are at risk of developing these



■ Assessing Safety / Security

In late February, 2018, the District completed a full security audit.

STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

As part of the Our Children, Our Community 2021 Strategic Plan, which was Board approved on April 25, 2017, 43 actions were created to ensure growth over the next five years. Last year, the District began implementing 34 of the 43 actions.

GOAL 1

Sustained Academic Excellence

Class of 2018 had one National AP Scholar, nine students named AP Scholars with Distinction, six students named AP Scholars with Honors, 13 students named AP Scholars, and a total of 7.1 million dollars offered in scholarships.

GOAL 2

Hire, Develop and Retain Staff Talent

During the 2017-18 school year, six certified staff positions were added as called for in the strategic plan.

GOAL 3

Assure Stakeholder Engagement

Throughout the 2017-18 school year, Superintendent O'Leary presented 58 Aviator Achievement Awards. These awards are presented to students and staff members who perform outstanding excellence.

District administration began laying the groundwork of creating an Alumni Association.

During the September, 2017, regular BOE meeting, Superintendent O'Leary presented a State of the Schools presentation to the Board and community members and all service clubs.

GOAL 4

Promote Local Governance

The District continues to participate in Youth In Government Day. Through YIG day, Butler High School Government Studies students are paired with a local government leader from either the School District, the City of Vandalia or Butler Township to learn about government process and procedures.

The VBCSD school board and school officials met with Ohio State School Board Representative Charlotte McGuire in October 2017 to share concerns ranging from state testing, report cards, and school funding.

GOAL 5

Maintain a Future Facilities Plan

The District has completed a facilities assessment and reengaged the facilities committee.
